A message from the chair



In this our twelfth year of operation it is a pleasure to present this 2018/2019 Annual Report and again report a positive year for the Foundation. In September this year we celebrated 12 years of service to the community of South West Victoria.

In that twelve years the Foundation has built trust funds of a little over \$2 million and has distributed more than \$880,000 in grants supporting charitable activity in the region. This year another \$126,083 has been shared between 39 projects. In addition, the Foundation has organised the distribution of 750 Back-to-School vouchers to students in need of some support across the region.

The Foundation provides not only opportunities for enriching, supporting, creative and charitable activity across the community now but also an insurance fund against disasters or crises in the future. The current needs are demonstrated by the fact that requests for grants far exceeded our capacity to provide support. The value of having the Foundation as an insurance for the future is clear in an uncertain world where natural and man-made disasters are occurring in increasing numbers. At a time of crisis in our region our funds could be quickly mobilised in response.

Despite the record of success and its potential future importance, the Foundation has not been able to achieve a strong place in the community's awareness. Our regular donor base is small and we struggle to compete for philanthropic support amongst the other worthy but narrowly focused short-term causes. During 2020 we will be making a special effort to increase our funds base by increasing community awareness of the value of having a permanent resource that can be drawn on rather than depending on individual fund raising efforts as needs arise.

The work of driving the Foundation is, as always, largely dependent on the voluntary contributions of time and expertise by the members of the Board. The work of all Directors is vital to the work the Foundation does and should be appreciated by all. It is however particularly appreciated by me in my role as Chair. This past year we have been disappointed to lose the services of Phillipa Dee, but delighted to welcome Edith Farrell to the Board. Edith's deep knowledge of the Glenelg part of our region has been missing from the Board for some time.

Special thanks are due to our hard working Executive Officer, Karen Norris, who squeezes so much output from her limited employment hours.

Of course, the work of the Foundation would not be possible without all the philanthropists who support the Foundation – the donors, the sponsors, the volunteers. Particular thanks to Sinclair Wilson who manage our financial affairs and provide investment advice, but also to the other supporters listed elsewhere in the Annual Report. To all these people and organisations, on behalf of the Board and the community of south west Victoria, please accept sincere thanks. 2018/2019 has been a steady year for the Foundation and has provided a base for more good work across south west Victoria in 2020.

About us

Vibrant, sustainable communities were part of Josie Black's vision for south west Victoria. She was a community leader and a strong advocate for education and training, health, regional tourism, arts and youth development. Her vision and commitment drove the establishment of the South West Community Foundation in September 2007. In September 2007, the then Governor of Victoria, Professor David DeKretser, together with our founder, Josie Black, officially launched the Foundation.

South West Community Foundation supports charitable activities in the community of south west Victoria. It provides a way for ordinary people to support and invest in the future of their community.

The Foundation has four Trust Funds: the Public Fund, Open Fund, Scholarship Fund and Disaster Relief Fund. All except the Open Fund are recognised as Deductible Gift Recipients (DGR) funds by the Australian Taxation Office meaning that donations can be claimed as tax exempt. All four are also Income Tax Exempt Funds (ITEF), this means the income from our investments is tax free and is returned to the community through our annual community grants.

The Foundation is structured as a public not-for-profit company limited by guarantee.





Total grants from the Foundation to the south west community since 2007 is now over





Back to School

This year the Foundation distributed 754 vouchers each worth \$50 for allocation to young people across 71 schools in the south west. The total value of the vouchers distributed is \$37,700. The schools involved are both primary and secondary schools spread across the whole of the south west's six municipalities.

The vouchers are for uniforms, shoes and other school requisites. They are allocated on the advice of the schools to students from families that are finding it financially tough keeping their children properly set up for school.

The Foundation again wishes to thank the Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal (FRRR) and the Isobel and David Jones Family Foundation for their generous support in the provision of these vouchers along with our Foundation.

Some of Our Stories

Over the past decade the Foundation has proudly been able to support and facilitate funding worth over \$880,000. Below are some of the recent project supported and how this funding has assisted their organisation and ultimately their communities.



D-Force – Victoria Police Hamilton

D-Force is a student-led, games-based educational approach used within schools to protect young people from the dangers of the drug ice, or methamphetamine. Schools use the D-Force Program to help young people understand the risks of taking methamphetamine, and how to get help if they or someone they know is at risk.

Project Coordinator, Kelly
McNaughton from Victorian
Police Hamilton stated:
It's about learning how ice affects
your body, it's about learning what
support is out there beyond just
you mum and dad. We are trying
to equip kids with self resilience,
before they get impacted by peer
group pressure or find themselves
being offered the drug!

Worn Gundidj Aboriginal Co-Operative

The 2018 grant was used to construct outdoor furniture – 5 tables and seats at Tower Hill through the Hands on Learning Program at Warrnambool College consisting of 20 students - years 7-9.

Hands on Learning Founder Russell Kerr was at the launch of the new facilities at Tower Hill and said it was amazing to see the growth of the program in the south west.





Warrnambool East Primary School – Nurturing Room

Assistant Principal -Robyn Ledin states: Our program continues to thrive and meet the needs of these vulnerable students. The opportunity to add Music and Art Therapy to the program, to purchase additional sensory resources and to use these resources to operate an additional Sensory Program, has enhanced the development of oral language, and social and emotional skills of vulnerable students. Running the additional sensory program for older students has enabled the principles of nurture to be applied across the school, and meet the needs of a wider range and number of students.





South West Healthcare Portland Mental Health

The 2018 grant was used to facilitate the Portland Card Making Group. This group has been functioning for a few years and benefits people with 'life difficulties.

Judy Moodie, Group Facilitator stated.

The project at the Card Making Group has helped people to improve their independent living skills, social relationships and promotion of their self-direction along with the ability to accept direction.

South West Healthcare – Greening Rotary House

Funding was used to fund an extension of the solar array on Rotary House to more completely meet daytime usage. Elvira Hewson, Environmental Sustainability Project Officer states:

As part of our commitment to delivering health care in a manner that minimises harm to the environment, South West Healthcare is seeking to reduce electricity consumption through the implementation of renewable energy projects. Greening Rotary House will provide tangible public environmental benefits and be used in education of staff, patients and visitors regarding the importance of reducing energy consumption where possible.





Penhurst Men's Shed

The 2018 project was the inaugural fit-out of tools and equipment in the Penshurst Men's Shed, a workshop created to benefit both men and women in Penshurst and the surrounding region. The Shed acts as a meeting place not just for hobbyists but also as a social centre and one where workshops focus on men's health and wellbeing across all ages. Ama Cooke, Treasurer states:

The tools in our hands were a part of the greater tools that form from communication between individuals, as they work sideby-side, creating projects that benefit young and old. As part of the growing progress of our Shed, the tools provided by the grant from the South West Community Foundation helped us 'lend a hand' wherever it was needed. From the young to our Elders, the tools have provided treasured additions to, and gentle reminders of, activities both past and present.

Trust Funds of the Foundation

There are four Trust Funds that together make up the Corpus of the Foundation. Income from this Corpus in turn provides the basis for the Foundation's granting to charitable activity within the community. The four Trust Funds are:

SWCF Public Fund – a fund able to accept tax deductible donations and make grants to ATO registered Item 1 DGR (deductible grant recipient) charitable organisations.

SWCF Open Fund – donations are not tax deductible but grants can be made to any charitable activity or organisation.

SWCF Disaster Relief Fund – donations to this fund are tax deductible and grants can be made to individuals or organisations who are suffering as a result of a Declared Disaster.

SWCF Scholarship Fund – can receive tax deductible donations and make grants to individuals provided that certain nominated requirements are met.

SWCF allocates donations and income received to one or more of the Trust Funds, and where requested to one or more Managed Sub-Fund Accounts. Donors may nominate both the Trust Fund and the Managed Account:

The Managed Sub-Fund Accounts include:

- SWCF Colac Region Sub Fund
- SWCF Koroit and District Sub Fund
- SWCF Greater Hamilton Sub Fund

Named Memorial, and Named Benfactors donations may nominate to have funds in any or all of the Trust Funds and Managed Accounts. The Foundation's General Fund and Sub-Funds seek to have investments in both the Public Fund and Open Fund to increase the flexibility of granting.
