A message from the chair



This is our eleventh year of operation and it is again a pleasure to present this 2017/2018 Annual Report. The Foundation has enjoyed another constructive year, maintaining the value of our Trust funds and continuing a strong grant making program, against consistently low interest rates.

Over the 10+ years of operation the Foundation has built trust funds of a little over \$2 million and this year another \$134,565 has been shared between 42 projects. In total the Foundation has now been responsible for the distribution of approximately \$750,000 in grants supporting charitable and developmental activity across the region.

Our new style and logo depicting our 'helping hands' role has been well received and is helping us in gaining wider community recognition.

The Foundation provides not only an annual opportunity to support charitable activities in the community but also provides the region with a reserve fund against disasters or crises in the future. This 'insurance' role has been demonstrated in the past year through our capacity to respond immediately to the needs arising from the St Patrick's Day fires across the region. The Board was able to immediately dedicate \$25,000 to assist with the fire recovery efforts. This allocation was over and above the regular grant making program. Meanwhile, the value of and demand for, the ongoing annual granting program was demonstrated by the fact that requests for grants again far exceeded our capacity to provide support.

A disappointing aspect of the past year's activity was our lack of ability to further grow the base trust funds. Despite our record of success in supporting and enriching our communities, the Foundation has not been able to achieve a strong place in the community's philanthropic awareness. Our regular donor base is small and we struggle to compete for support amongst the other worthy but narrowly focused causes. As a result, during 2019 we will be making a special effort to increase our trust funds base by increasing awareness of the value of having a permanent resource that can be depended on into the future rather than hoping for individual fund raising support as crises arise. We will be looking to increase our regular donor base through efforts like work-place giving programs and giving circles, as well as offering more fund raising events.

The nature of the Foundation is that it is largely dependent on the voluntary contributions of time and expertise by the members of the Board. The efforts of all Directors are vital to the work the Foundation does and should be appreciated by the community. Certainly they are appreciated by me as Chair. This past year we have been delighted to welcome Dr. Laurel Myers, Richard Zerbe and Phillippa Dee to the Board. Their energy and varied expertise are of great value to the Board's work.

Special thanks are also again due to our hard-working Executive Officer, Karen Norris, who squeezes so much output from her limited hours.

Many thanks also to the many organisations and companies that support and sponsor our work. Particular thanks to Sinclair Wilson who manage our financial affairs and provide investment advice, but also to the other supporters listed elsewhere in this Annual Report. We look forward to 2018/2019 as a year of ongoing growth and opportunities in our role of underpinning resilience and well-being across our region.

About us

Vibrant, sustainable communities were part of Josie Black's vision for south west Victoria. She was a community leader and a strong advocate for education and training, health, regional tourism, arts and youth development. Her vision and commitment drove the establishment of the South West Community Foundation in September 2007. In September 2007, the then Governor of Victoria, Professor David DeKretser, together with our founder, Josie Black, officially launched the Foundation. South West Community Foundation supports charitable activities in the community of south west Victoria. It provides a way for ordinary people to support and invest in the future of their community.

The Foundation has four Trust Funds: the Public Fund, Open Fund, Scholarship Fund and Disaster Relief Fund. All except the Open Fund are recognised as Deductible Gift Recipients (DGR) funds by the Australian Taxation Office meaning that donations can be claimed as tax exempt. All four are also Income Tax Exempt Funds (ITEF), this means the income from our investments is tax free and is returned to the community through our annual community grants.

The Foundation is structured as a public not-for-profit company limited by guarantee.





Total grants from the Foundation to the south west community since 2007 is now over



Back to School

In 2018 the South West Community Foundation has facilitated 826 \$50 Target Back to School vouchers worth \$41,300 to over 66 schools within the south west region of Victoria.

108 of these vouchers were recently provided to schools impacted by the St Patrick's Day Fires. We wish these families well in the coming months and know that the Foundation will be here for the long haul if they require further assistance!

Some of Our Stories

Over the past decade the Foundation has proudly been able to support and facilitate funding to over approximately 200 projects worth over \$770,000. Below are some of the recent project supported and how this funding has assisted their organisation and ultimately their communities.

Leadership Great South Coast

In 2017 the Foundation supported the Leadership Great South Coast Annual Program with two part -scholarships with the successful applicants being Juanita Dickson, Venue Support Worker with Bethany Community Support and Alison Kennedy, PhD,BBSc (Honours), PostGradDipArts(Criminology), Behavioural Scientist/Research Fellow — Deakin University/ National Centre Farmer Health. Juanita's feedback of the program indicated:

I am ready and willing to start giving back and I am engaged and committed to doing whatever I can to support my workplace, community and the broader region to thrive within opportunities and exceed whatever challenges it is met with. I would like to thank the South West Community Foundation for very generously committing to the development of leaders within the Great South Coast region and to my employer Bethany Community Support for allowing me the time to attend the Program.

Koroit & District Kindergarten Story Wall (Koroit & District Sub Fund)

The SWCF grant has allowed Koroit & District Kindergarten to finish a long-standing project that celebrates the heritage our kindergarten.

The meeting place was the first completed grant, the Koroit & District Signage the second completed grant and now the gabion fence ties it all together as a wonderful talking point at the front of kindergarten for the entire community to enjoy. Sam O'Keefe, President, Koroit & District Kindergarten stated about this project:

The children enjoy using the front yard and the meeting place whilst surrounded by the story wall, which sparks interest in different fill items each time, encouraging discussion and learning. The public has also loved watching the gabion wall take shape, with residents stopping and chatting every time we worked on it. They are fascinated with the story (which sparked the idea of the night lighting and descriptive plaques) and on many occasions thanked the kindergarten for providing a fantastic piece of art to brighten up the street.

Hands on Learning - Warrnambool College

The Community Seedling project supported by the Isobel and David Jones Family Foundation, facilitated by the South West Community Foundation was the development of the Warrnambool College's current garden area into a more sustainable and userfriendly space. Leon Carey states about the outcomes of the project in 2017:

Throughout the year, students have worked incredibly well as a team and have undertaken tasks such as mortaring in pavers, using various tools, building garden beds, filling garden beds, digging and planting new vegetables and plant seedings as well as succulents with the purpose to donating them to various community groups. By obtaining this grant, we were able to expand our network in the local community.



Hands on Learning – Brauer College

The St Helens Bio Link Landcare project was kindly supported by the Niall Foundation facilitated by the South West Community Foundation. The project was focused on protecting rare wildlife and building habitat in the St Helens area. Lisette Mill's @ Basalt to Bay Landcare, stated:

The Basalt to Bay Landcare Network took up the challenge to progress talk to do - and as a result six students in Year 8 Hands on Learning Program at Brauer College recently came with their trainers to finish building the new 370m long boundary fence. Australian Bluegums Pty Ltd funded getting the old fence removed, all the materials, and getting the new posts driven ahead of training day. ABP Contract fencer Matt Rentsch and ABP Forester Jess Domaschenz making sure that was completed ahead of weather that makes this site inaccessible. The Niall Foundation via regional funder the South West Community Foundation resourced the transport to this remote site and Australian hose manufacturer Pope Industries in Adelaide gifted 370m of hose to help make the new fence more visible to wildlife.

Colac Kana Festival 60th Birthday (Colac Sub Fund)

Lyn Russell, Secretary of the Colac Kana Festival stated:

The grant was used to pay the cost of the community stage, being the stage and audio system. This allows the stage to be used by local talent, make announcements as well as introduce winners of parade and colouring competition. Our aim is to provide a free family festival in Colac which promotes local organisations and talent. By funding the community stage we were able to also provide the stage to Diversitat to introduce cultural activities to the festival and continue the 60 years free entertainment.

Warrnambool Toy Library – Toys for the South West Community

Bonnie Lucas, President of the Warrnambool Toy Library provided the following feedback about this project:

Thank you South West Community Foundation for helping us update our amazing Toy Library's range of toys to suit the changing needs of our community! We have purchased many toys that reflect our growing multicultural community, educating and welcoming the next generation through play. Your generosity has also enabled the purchase or a range of STEM toys which fit with the current educational trends and demands of south west residents. Again, thank you!

South West Fire Recovery Fund

After the devastating St. Patrick Fires in our region in March 2018, the South West Community Foundation quickly created a Fire Recovery Fund to support our affected communities. The Foundation started an initial allocation of \$20,000 from its general gift funds and was augmented with donations kindly received from individuals within our community. The Foundation's immediate support was the provision of \$100 IGA Food Vouchers to Families who were affected directly by the fire. The Foundation also provided \$50 Back to School Vouchers to the Schools whose families were impacted by these fires as well. The Foundation wishes to thank the many donations received and note that we are here for the long haul if further support is needed.

Trust Funds of the Foundation

There are four Trust Funds that together make up the Corpus of the Foundation. Income from this Corpus in turn provides the basis for the Foundation's granting to charitable activity within the community. The four Trust Funds are:

SWCF Public Fund -

a fund able to accept tax deductible donations and make grants to ATO registered Item 1 DGR (deductible grant recipient) charitable organisations.

SWCF Open Fund – donations are not tax deductible but grants can be made to any charitable activity or organisation.

SWCF Disaster Relief Fund – donations to this fund are tax deductible and grants can be made to individuals or organisations who are suffering as a result of a Declared Disaster.

SWCF Scholarship Fund – can receive tax deductible donations and make grants to individuals provided that certain nominated requirements are met.

SWCF allocates income received to one or more of the Trust Funds and to one or more Managed Sub-Fund Accounts. Donors may nominate both the Trust Fund and the Management Account:

The Managed Sub-Fund Accounts include:

- SWCF General Fund
- SWCF Colac Region Sub Fund
- · SWCF Koroit and District Sub Fund
- SWCF Greater Hamilton Sub Fund
- SWCF Josie's Sub Fund

Memorial donations may nominate to have funds in any or all of the Trust Funds and Management Accounts. The Foundation's General Fund and Sub-Funds seek to have investments in both the Public Fund and Open Fund to increase the flexibility of granting.
